Thursday, February 2nd, @ 2 p.m.

Visit to the Holocaust Museum, 851 N Maitland Avenue, Maitland.

Plan to arrange carpools with other club members and we will meet at the Holocaust Museum, at 2 p.m. Ample parking is available outside the museum at the Jewish Community Center, nearest the intersection of Maitland Ave. and Maitland Blvd. If you need assistance finding the entrance call 407-628-0555.

The Holocaust Center houses a permanent exhibit that tells the story of the Holocaust in a way that appeals to diverse audiences. We will be treated to a docent led tour of the museum and have an opportunity to listen to the recorded testimonies of several Holocaust Survivors who settled in Central Florida.

In addition we will have a unique opportunity to enjoy the exhibition, Anne Frank: A History for Today.

The life history of Anne Frank and her family is the leading thread running through this exhibition. The family's story is juxtaposed against world events before, during and after the rise to power of the Nazi party. The exhibit includes photographs of the Frank family and the other occupants of the Secret Annex and shows how people were persecuted by political decisions and by the actions of individuals. Throughout the exhibit, Anne's own wonderfully candid writing provides a central voice to the exhibit narrative, bringing a poignant and truly beautiful perspective to the story. 


Thursday, February 9th, @ 2 p.m.

"What Makes Musical Instruments Musical? The Science of Making and Playing Musical Instruments."

Speaker: Dr. Thomas Moore, Rollins Professor of Physics

Building a high quality musical instrument requires extreme artistry and craftsmanship, but often even



those who make such instruments do not understand how they work. Scientists have recently taken an interest in learning how musical instruments actually make music, and they are only now beginning to understand much of what has been empirically known to musicians for centuries.

Using a series of demonstrations on a variety of musical instruments, Thomas Moore will explain some of what we know and what we still do not know about music and how it is produced. He will introduce the principles that underpin what makes a sound musical, demonstrate how some instruments are built, and

discuss why some instruments are considered superior while others are only given to beginning students. The answers involve art, science, psychology, and mystery.

Our speaker, Rollins Professor, Thomas Moore is the Archibald Granville Bush Professor of Natural Science at Rollins College. He earned a B.S. in physics from Stetson University, a M.S. in nuclear physics from the U.S. Naval Postgraduate School, and a Ph.D. from the Institute of Optics at the University of Rochester. Prior to accepting a position at Rollins College, Professor Moore served in the U.S. Army for 21 years, worked at Lawrence Livermore National Laboratory, and taught physics at the U.S. Military Academy

(West Point). His current research interests are in understanding the physics involved in producing musical sound and the development of optical methods for analyzing sound.

Dr. Moore, was honored as "Florida Professor of the Year" in 2013 for his commitment to undergraduate education and research in science. This award is given by the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching and the Council for Advancement and Support of Education (CASE) and recognizes the most outstanding instructors in the nation, who excel as teachers, role models, and make a large impact on the lives and careers of their students. Moore was selected from the 350 top teachers in the United States. We are honored to have Dr. Moore share his passion for physics, music and education with us.

Thursday, February 16th, @ 11:30 a.m. Lite Luncheon "Architecture Through the Ages" Speaker: Brooks Weiss, City of Winter Park Architect

During the last election cycle, Historic Preservation became a hotly debated topic in Winter Park. Brooks Weiss will speak with us about his experiences as the staff liaison to the Winter Park Historic Preservation Board (HPB). He will also address his plans to broaden awareness of historic preservation in Winter Park.



Brooks and his young family relocated to Winter Park in 1975 after he accepted a position with Nils Schweizer's architectural firm, the Environmental Design Group. They bought a small cottage on Via Salerno in 1976 and in 1981 did a major renovation and expansion of the home. They live there still.

Brooks was fortunate enough to have a varied career, working and living in London, Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia, Los Angeles and other assignments in Europe, Asia and the USA.

In June of 2016, Brooks accepted the position of City Architect with the City of Winter Park. As such, he is also the liaison to the Historic Preservation Board. He continues to be proactive in his work with the City and the HPB. He brings a depth of knowledge involving entertainment design, historic adaptive reuse, mixed-use development and residential design to his work for the City. You will want to hear Brooks ideas for Historic Preservation in Winter Park.

Family Promise of Greater Orlando

Family Promise of Greater Orlando provides shelter, meals, transportation, and supportive services for up to 90 days for homeless families. This organization partners with various congregations in the local area which provide overnight lodging for these families in need as well as dinner, snacks and breakfast for up to one week at each facility as required by the families. The objective for Family Promise is to find permanent housing for each homeless family within 90 days.



Tia Aery has been Executive Director of Family Promise of Greater Orlando since October, 2014. Her nearly twenty years experience with the Family Promise program and homeless families, has included a position as Executive Director of a Family Promise affiliate in New Jersey for twelve years, followed by a position as Executive Director of Interfaith Hospitality Network of Essex County MS. Most recently, Ms. Aery worked for Family Promise national as the Florida Regional Director before assuming her current role.

A Gift for Teaching

A Gift for Teaching (AGFT) was established in 1998 to improve public education by providing resources and surplus materials free to teachers for their students in need. The non-profit is now considered Central Florida's primary provider of free school supplies that enable these children to dream, create and experience success in school and in life. The 2015-2016 school year was one of major milestones for AGFT, hosting more than 6,000 teachers and donating essential school supplies to more than 120,000 students in need. Additionally, a Mobile Free Store as well as Online shopping have helped grow the organization's distribution by 20% in just one school year.



Marisa Worley has served as Director of Development for A Gift for Teaching since she joined the non-profit's team in 2013. She has been a major part of revamping the Back-to-School campaign, increasing fundraising in the organization's Year End Campaign, sustaining the new Pencil Boy Programs, and successfully growing the annual Back-to-School Blast event. Prior to her current position, Marisa served as Senior Director of Chamber Initiatives and Events at the Winter Park Chamber of Commerce, worked as a Senior Associate with Massey Communications and managed Public Relations for the Florida Theatrical Association/Broadway Across America Orlando. A Magna Cum Laude graduate of Rollins College and

Welbourne Avenue Nursery & Kindergarten was established in 1927, to provide affordable, quality childcare for working families living in Hannibal Square (Winter Park Westside). Today, the center continues to offer high standards in childcare and education, serving culturally diverse families in a loving and nurturing environment. The curricula focuses on infants as young as 6 weeks to children 5 years of age. The fees for the center services are adjusted according to the ability of the families to pay.

Nursery & Kindergarten, Inc. She joined the Welbourne family in May of 2012, as Assistant Director and in August 2012, achieved her Directors Credential. Charitable Giving



Did You Know? By Kim Mould

As author J. M. Barrie wrote in the dedication of his beloved book *Peter Pan*, "A safe but sometimes chilly way of recalling the past is to force open a crammed drawer. If you are searching for anything in particular you don't find it, but something falls out at the back that is often more interesting" (1904). In my work as a historian, this happens to me every day. Recently, in looking through the Woman's Club of Winter Park archival collection for items of interest for our recent Founder's Day Event, I stumbled upon a document folder, in the very back of an archival box, that brought to life a person whose name I was familiar with, but, in reality, I knew very little about. Miss Helen Steinmetz.

Most members of the Woman's Club are familiar with the wonderful work done by the Scholarship Committee. The Scholarship Committee and Fund was founded in 1938, and the program has continued to provide deserving students loans and grants to further their education. However, "In 1979, the Scholarship Committee was notified that Miss Steinmetz had died and that she has bequeathed a portion of her Estate to the Scholarship Fund, with specific instructions that the money be invested and only the income from the investment be used to assist in education of Florida Indian girls" (Mildred S. Murphy, Steinmetz Biography, 1988). From a few biographical histories, original scholarship letters signed by Helen, committee reports, and documents and photographs obtained from the Rollins College Archives by Mildred Murphy for a Scholarship Tea, Helen Steinmetz begins to come to life.

Helen was born in Norristown, Pennsylvania, but, for reasons unknown, lived at the home of her Uncle John, her father's twin brother. A brief history on Helen drawn from Rollins College archival documents indicate her uncle, Major John B. Steinmetz, "was the Chairman of Orange County Road Commission when the first tracks were laid for the railroad from Orlando to Sanford" and "that her uncle owned several

paddlewheelers for travelling on the river" (Murphy, 1988). She attended Rollins Academy, similar to high



school, and graduated with the Class of 1903 -1904. Rollins academic records indicate she was awarded a certificate for classes completed in the Business School, and she also took "ladylike courses as Sewing, Music, Expression, Fine Arts and Domestic and Industrial Arts." In the photograph from the Rollins College Archives, Helen is in the second row, the second student from the left with the dark bow tie. Julia Steinmetz, possibly a cousin, is sitting in the first row, first student from the left with the dark long tie. Helen established a home at 135 Cortland Avenue in Winter Park, was a life time member of the Woman's Club of Winter Park from 1945 until her death in 1979, she never married or had children, and "apparently never worked for monetary gain" (Murphy, 1988).

During her time as a Woman's Club of Winter Park member, she played an active role on the Scholarship

Committee, even serving as Chairman in 1960 – 1961. A committee report from November, 1960, with Helen's signature, relates how the committee "granted a gift scholarship to a Seminole Indian. This has worked out in a most unexpected way...the girl we were to sponsor...wrote back that for the amount ...we could help two girls if that was alright with our committee...Another surprise came our way when one of the girls whose name had been chosen asked if she could share her money with a friend who wanted to attend the same school." Geneva Shore was the name of the generous student who wished to share her scholarship, and a photograph of her from the Woman's Club Archives indicates that she graduated from Haskell College, in Lawrence, Kansas, in 1961.

In 1961, Helen moved to La Jolla, California. Upon her death in 1979, attorneys settling her estate revealed she had a trust from her father's estate, and, after remembering several cousins and friends, she divided the remainder of her estate in part to Rollins College and its Book-A-Year Fund and to the Woman's Club of Winter Park with "specific instructions that the money (a little over \$20,000)...used to assist in education of Florida Indian girls" (Murphy, 1988).

So, as J. M. Barrie said, sometimes "something falls out of the back that is often more interesting." From a long over-

WOMAN'S CLUB OF WINTER PARK, FLORIDA Nov. 2nd., 1960 The Scholarship Committee of the Woman's Club of Winter Park Has awarded five Scholarships for 196-'6i, Two, to girls at Rollins, one to go Emory and two to girls who are student nurses at Hospitals in Jacksonville, Florida. With the permission of the Board we granted a gift scholarship to a Seminole Indian. This has worked out in a nost unexspected way, When we wrote to Mrs Cowles of Ft. Pierce asking what the expenses would be and if we could have the name of the girl we were to sponsor she wrote back that for the amount we had decided on we could help two girls if that was alright with our committee. It seems the girls go to Government Schools and have no tuition to pay but have to pay all other expenses Another surprise came our way when one of the girls whoses name had been chosen asked if she could share her money with a friend who wanted to attend the same school, as she Edeneva Shore on had been able to earn enough during the summer to need only half of the \$200.00 we had sent for her. So we find our selves with the money we exspected would be enough to help one girl helping three,
Should also add that before we knew that the student would have no twition to pay we, our comm. decided we would with clothing if it was needed and I asked the Needlework Guild if they would help us They did and through them we were able to send several things. the credit going first to them then to the Woman&s Club when I sent them on. Helen Steinmet Chairman of Scholarship Comm

looked folder, in a little explored archival box, out fell the personal story of Helen Steinmetz, forgotten except for the name on a scholarship, yet by "her deep interest in education of Indian girls has truly established a lasting memorial" (Murphy, 1988).

Now this is where it gets really interesting and exciting! My boundless curiosity compelled me to find and chat with, if possible, Ms. Geneva Shore, the scholarship recipient, and in next month's *Highlights* article, I will share the story of Geneva, her family, and her ongoing work with the Florida Seminole Tribe.
