Rev. Garvey also served as Interim Dean at Knowles Chapel from 2014-2016. Furthermore, he is on the boards of the Mayflower Retirement

He has been named one of "Winter Park's Most Influential People." An accomplished singer and guitar player, Rev. Garvey has released three albums of original material and worked with well-known musicians such as Seal, Mary Fahl, Steve Weisberg, and Livingston Taylor, (brother of James). You may have had the pleasure of hearing him at Casa Feliz and other venues in town. You will not want to miss this program.

Thursday, October 27th @ 2:00 p.m. Central Florida Community Arts

The club will be entertained by voices from the Central Florida Community Arts. Musicians, Joshua Vickery and Jonathan Cole,

founded the Central Florida Community Arts in February of 2011. While their mission is to Connect, Serve and Perform, their goal is to establish an organization where every musician could use their talent. Core values of integrity, creativity, quality, inclusiveness, wholesome entertainment and community service attracted many influential people in the area and soon a 501c3 organization was formed. Over 1,200 people came to their inaugural performance. Since that time, they have formed a choir of over 400 singers, including several separately themed choirs. In addition, they have created a community symphony orchestra of more than 130 players, as well as the CFCA School for Performing Arts with over 100 children. This is an affordable program of classes and workshops for school-age performers. Most recently, they have formed a Young Artist Orchestra for instrumentalists under the age of 18 and they have begun, in conjunction with the Dementia Resource Center and the Alzheimer's Association, a program for adults experiencing the early stages of memory loss. Our performers are part of the premier group of CFCA, called the Legacy Singers. Scott Kinkead and Heather McCraw will answer questions after their performance.




Did You Know? By Kim Mould

Karen J. Blair, in *Torchbearers: Women and Their Amateur Arts Associations in America, 1890 – 1930,* argues that "the costly venture into the field of clubhouse building" pursued by club women across the United States "was an endeavor that met with extraordinary, even brilliant, success. But the strains occasioned by building and maintaining clubhouses served to divide and deplete the women's club movement" (page 178). Despite other women's clubs in Florida ultimately having to close their beautiful clubhouses due to a decline in membership, for example the stunning Woman's Club of Jacksonville building, and the seemingly endless financial demands placed upon the members of the Woman's Club of Winter Park, for clubhouse maintenance and preservation expenditures since 1921, our newly restored clubhouse is a permanent reminder of what can be accomplished through commitment, persistence, and unified effort.

Beginning in 1917, the clubhouse acquisition process benefited the Woman's Club of Winter Park members by propelling them out of their comfortable familial and societal spheres and engaging them in a variety of efforts that sharpened their reputations as forces to be dealt with in the Winter Park community. The club's ambitious mission encouraged the cultivation and application of each individual member's unique skills and talents, while demanding a cooperative effort. After Charles and Helen Morse donated five town lots, the Building Committee was formed with Grace O. Edwards as committee chair. This committee, which incorporated both the house and grounds, evaluated the design abilities of several prominent architects before retaining the services of Mr. L. Percival Hutton of New York, the nephew of active club member Mrs. Robert MacDonald.

An intriguing collection of letters and bills found in the club archives documents timethe consuming and often frustrating process designing and building clubhouse the incorporating both the insistent demands and desires of the club's membership and fundamental architectural theory. Frank V. Bodine, an Orlando architect on South Orange Avenue, served as Mr. Hutton's local representative, and L. C. Townsend, important local



contractor, built the structure. The ladies of the club wanted it built well and done quickly. One bill from L. C. Townsend and Co. to the Woman's Club stresses that despite the amounts of "cost to date," "it is impossible for us to give an intelligent estimate on this work as we have never had a complete set of plans or any specifications to work from. Mr. Hutton has been sending these as he finishes them. We started this work at the time without a complete set so as we would not delay the building" (October 1, 1920, Box 8). An exchange of letters indicates the club members were demanding in their specifications, yet frequently changed their minds. According to a club history written in 1947, Susan Dyer, the second club president, was energetic in her pursuit of the building project. However, "World War I made the work of this building so difficult that Mr. J. K. List and Mr. H. A. Ward undertook its supervision and pushed the work forward" (Box 26). Ultimately, the stately Woman's Club of Winter Park clubhouse was ready for occupancy in January, 1921, ahead of schedule.
