We are creating a continuing life cycle for the vocal arts in Central Florida through a three-step model. The first step, Education and Training introduces young artists to the arts. Through our educational initiatives, we develop students' talent, passion and confidence. Our Main stage Productions provides a transition period for students, ages 8-18, to emerge on stage alongside local, professional talent. Our life cycle culminates with Opera del Sol, offering innovative productions in unexpected places, challenging perceptions of who the operatic performer and audience member are and what defines the genre as a whole.

MEET: Annette Kelly, MSN, PhD, ARNP, and FCN

Annette Kelly is a graduate of St. Vincent's Hospital School of Nursing in New York City, with a BSN from George Mason University in Fairfax, VA. She received a MSN, ARNP and PhD from the University of Florida. She also received a Faith Community Nurse (FCN) certification from St. Louis University. Her 60 years in nursing have included hospital and long-term care nursing, community program development, and non-profit leadership in dementia care, health research and nursing education. Dr. Kelly became interested in the Village Movement about 10 years ago after a presentation by Boston's Beacon Hill Village Founders. She started Neighbors Network with a group of community aging advocates with startup funding from the Winter Park Health Foundation.

MEET: Elizabeth Fullington, Founder

Elizabeth grew up in South America in an English-speaking country called Guyana, formerly British Guiana. She studied music with her mother Ruby Holland. At the age of 12, she became a 'pupil teacher' for younger music students in her mother's studio.

Elizabeth earned her LRSM - the Licentiate of Music - from the Royal Schools of Music, a Diploma in Choreography and Dance from the Kingston Teacher's College in Georgetown, Guyana, and a bachelor's degree in Education from the University of Guyana. After migrating to the United States, Elizabeth worked in Corporate America

and continued teaching music part-time. She later set up the Ruby Holland School of Music, and established an alliance with the Orlando Music Club, the Florida Federation of Music, and the National Guild of Piano Teachers. Her students have participated successfully at local, state, and international competitions and festivals both in Piano Performance and Music Composition. She has served as president for the Lake District Chapter of the Florida Federation of Music and served on their Board of Directors, and as an adjudicator for piano performance at both the District and State Levels for the Florida Federation of Music. She is an active member of the National Guild of Piano Teachers; she serves as a faculty member on The Piano Guild Board of Judges. She pioneered a study abroad program for her students, collaborating with the music department of University of Central Florida. The program was a huge success, which led to her including summer international music studies as part of her school's curriculum. Over the past 10 years, many of her students have benefited from studies at the International Festival for Creative Pianists, Boise, Idaho; the International Music Academy, Colombes, France, the Les Arc Music Festival in the French Alps, the Orfeo Music Festival in Vipiteno Italy, and most recently, the Verbier Music Festival in Valais, Switzerland. Mrs. Fullington manages the Ruby Holland Foundation and is able to continue her passion for helping young musicians.

MEET: Fairolyn Livingston, Chief Historian of the Hannibal Square Heritage Center

Fairolyn was born on the west side of Winter Park, Florida where she attended Welbourne Avenue Day Care, Hannibal Square Elementary School. She graduated from Hungerford High School, Eatonville, FL, Hampton Junior College, Ocala, FL and Rollins College, Winter Park, FL. Fairolyn is Chief Historian at the Hannibal Square Heritage Center in Winter Park where she served on the Photo Collection Team since 2001. She conducts walking tours of Hannibal Square and the Heritage Center Collection and exhibits. Fairolyn is a founding member of the

Truth and Justice Alliance (TJI) that was instrumental in bringing the July Perry Marker to Heritage Square in Orlando. TJI also worked with the City of Ocoee for the Marker to put a spotlight on the truth about the 1920 massacre when Blacks tried to vote in Ocoee. Fairolyn has won the Historical Society of Central Florida's Cheney Award, been recognized by Winter Park Magazine as one of the city's most influential residents and has been awarded the Fred Rogers Global Citizenship Award from Rollins College, which honors prominent alumni.



MEET: Kim Mould, Historian and Woman's Club of Winter Park Archivist

Kim is a local historian who graduated from Rollins College in 2000 with a Master's Degree in Liberal Studies. Her thesis, entitled *A Portrait in Black and White: The Ideal Woman's Club and the Woman's Club of Winter Park*, focused on the crucial role woman's clubs and benevolent organizations have played in enlarging and enhancing the social, intellectual and political sphere of American women and in shaping their communities. She was the 2001 recipient of

The Rhea Marsh and Dorothy Lockhart Smith Winter Park History Grant, sponsored by Rollins College and the Winter Park Public Library, and her research explored the relationship between two influential Winter Park clubwomen, Mrs. Maud Kraft and Mrs. Mary Lee DePugh. In 2001, Kim published an article entitled Mary Lee DePugh: An Evanston Influence in Winter Park, Florida in the publication Shorefront: History, News and Events in Chicago's Suburban North Shore.

As a 2003 recipient of a Florida Humanities Council Scholar/Humanist Fellowship, Kim researched six Winter Park notables, which the Winter Park Historical Association translated into the community history in *Their Own Voices* project. From the research, she also published, in 2013, an article in Winter Park Magazine the actress Annie Russell, *The Importance of Being Annie*, which, in 2014 won the Florida Magazine Association's honor of "Best Feature Story".

Kim proudly assisted with *The Heritage Collection: Photographs and Oral Histories of West Winter Park Project,* in addition to working as both a Collections Specialist/Archivist and Museum Docent for the Winter Park Historical Association. In 2016, she worked as a researcher for the Winter Park Historical Museum exhibit *The World War II Years: The Winter Park Homefront*. Since 2014, she has been the Woman's Club of Winter Park Historian and the Chair of the club's History Committee.

Theresa is the Founder and Executive Director of Central Florida Vocal Arts, which includes sister company, Opera del Sol. She is thrilled to make a uniquely female impact on the artistic identity of Central Florida.

Theresa is a Winter Park High School, University of Central Florida (B.M.E Music Education) and University of Miami (M.M. Vocal Performance) alumni, who performs and teaches voice regularly throughout the area. She was an honored member of American Express Women in Music Leadership Conference held in New York City in June 2019 and is a graduate of Leadership Winter Park Class 29. She is also a member of the Catalysts,

National Association of Teachers of Singing and Central Florida Community Arts Theatre Advisory Panel. She has won an array of awards for her singing, acting and direction, including Matt Palm's Top 20 Best of Fest 2018 Award for her one-woman show, *Save Me Dolly Parton* (Orlando Sentinel). A few of her favorite performance roles include the Baroness and Mother Abbess in *The Sound of Music*, Johanna in *Sweeney Todd* and Princess Margaret *in The Student Prince*. She is a sought after producer, performer, director and music director of both musical theater and classical works. Her voice students have been accepted into the most competitive music and musical theater programs across the county and have won prestigious national awards including the Applause Awards and the Jimmy Awards.

Theresa is most proud however of the impact her company has made on the artistic trajectory of so many and she is thrilled to be re-imagining the future of vocal arts. She is the proud mom of Bodhi (4), Beckham (2) and wife to Brent Levin, a graduate of Leadership Winter Park Class 30.
