### MEET: Christy Grieger



Christy is the Executive Director of the Winter Park Historical Association. Growing up, she lived in Tampa and then attended the University of Pittsburgh on a swimming scholarship and graduated with a BS in Sociology and Communications. Not being one to live in a cold climate, she moved back to Florida in 1995 and calls Longwood home but her heart is in Winter Park.

Christy worked for First Data Financial out of college and then was a corporate event planner for Hello Florida and House of Blues for many years. After her two children were born, she worked in her family's commercial printing company.

Wanting to move in the direction of her passion of local history, Christy became the executive assistant for the Winter Park History Museum and in 2020 she became the executive director.



She serves on the boards for Seminole County Historical Society, Altamonte Springs Historical Society and is on the Welbourne Day Nursery Board. In 2021, she was named one of Winter Park Magazine's Most Influential People.

Christy is a photographer that shoots landscapes, architecture and the details in life. She's happiest driving down back roads at sunset capturing the impermanence of things that catch her eye.

Christy's branding statement is "I want to be known for being a person who sees the extraordinary in the ordinary so that I can deliver appreciation for being in the moment."

The Winter Park History Museum just launched its new exhibition, "*Retailing Our Story: 100 Years Winter Park's Bistros, Boutiques and Businesses*", which dovetails with the Chamber of Commerce's 100th-year anniversary.

The WPHM will take a lighter look at commerce by showcasing past stores, many which have become objects of nostalgia, if not iconic, for Winter Park residents and visitors.

The permanent businesses "anchoring" the exhibit are the Colony Theater, where old films of downtown Winter Park will be projected, the "Pioneer" Store, Winter Park's first business that supplied all the necessities essential to living in the 1880s Florida frontier, and a "Children's Emporium", featuring popular games and toys of the past 100 years. A series of built-out stores has been created with awnings and store signage to create a Park Avenue street effect within the museum. New stores and merchandise will rotate into the spaces throughout the exhibition period. The first featured businesses are Proctor's, Harper's Tavern, and the Golden Cricket.

**MEET: David Newell**

“Mr. McFeely”, *Mister Rogers’ Neighborhood*

Former Director Public Relations for Fred Rogers Productions



David Newell played Mr. McFeely, the Neighborhood’s cheerful “Speedy Delivery” man, on *Mister Rogers’ Neighborhood*. From his first appearance in the very first episode, Mr. McFeely has been a fast-talking, purposeful, grandfatherly figure, always in a hurry shuttling from stop to stop because of the demands of his “Speedy Delivery Messenger Service.” The character was also an intentional counterpoint to Mister Rogers’ slower, more methodical pace. David was originally hired onto the show as a public relations manager, but Rogers also decided to cast him in the role of Mr. McFeely. As a result, he and Rogers became lifelong friends until Rogers’ death in 2003.

**MEET: Hedda Sharapan**

Hedda began working with Fred Rogers 56 years ago on the very first taping day of *Mister Rogers’ Neighborhood* in October 1966. Over the years since then, building on her master’s degree in Child Development, she has served as Assistant Director, Assistant Producer, Associate Producer and Director of Early Childhood Initiatives for his small non-profit production company. These days as a Child Development consultant for Fred Rogers Productions, she is a script consultant for its award-winning PBS children’s series *Daniel Tiger’s Neighborhood* and other projects.

**MEET: Margy Whitmer**

Producer, *Mister Rogers’ Neighborhood*

Scripting Consultant, Fred Rogers Productions



Margy Whitmer served as producer of *Mister Rogers’ Neighborhood* for a number of years until production ended in 2001. She also produced the live-action interstitials for *Daniel Tiger’s Neighborhood* and is now a scripting consultant for the series. Over the years, Margy was the company’s liaison with PBS’s *Ready To Learn* Initiative; co-creator, writer, and producer for video-based professional development workshop materials; and project director for two series of picture books, *First Experiences* and *Let’s Talk About It*. Her previous experience includes production and administrative positions at WQED-TV for both local and national programs, including *Once Upon a Classic* and the *National Geographic Specials*.
