# **Historian**

A few fascinating "summer" artifacts from our Woman's Club of Winter Park Archives

Traditionally, The Woman's Club of Winter Park club year officially runs from September/October to the end of April, especially in the early years before our beautiful clubhouse was built and wonderfully airconditioned. During the hot summer months in Florida, many club members often "went North." Other residents enjoyed a slower lifestyle with simple pleasures such as swimming, boating, and having leisurely picnics on the shores of the Winter Park lakes and at the coastal

beaches, quietly reading books, such as The Works of Edgar Allan Poe (1904), while gently rocking on their porches or in their gardens, and visiting with friends and family. Woman's Club members went on record as being opposed to "immodest dress," so it would be fun to know what they thought of this young lady's bathing suit from an old Ivory Soap ad found in a July, 1917 National issue of Geographic Magazine. Wouldn't they be shocked at the bathing suit styles of today!



In 1917, before our clubhouse was built, Winter Park was a sleepy town. On April 6, 1917, the Americans officially entered World War 1 by declaring war on Germany, and American and Winter Park life changed. The ladies of the Woman's Club swiftly got organized and went to work making jams/jellies to send to "our boys," working with the Red Cross, and raising money for War Bonds. During the summer of 1917, Americans also educated themselves on world events by reading such periodicals as The National Geographic Magazine with its fascinating articles, maps and illustrations. Soon, they would learn of the real horrors, as opposed to Poe's literary frights, facing both European civilians and American troops on the battlefields and in the trenches of Europe.

A special thank you to our artifact donors, John West for his donation of vintage, beautifully wrapped lvory Soap bars, to The Winter Park History Museum for a wonderful collection of original National Geographic publications from our early years, and a special hug and thank you to our member Maureen Holloway for her very generous contribution of gorgeous heirloom hard cover books, many over 100 years old!
